## Fulfilment –

ow do you seek fulfilment? What lifts your spirit? What do you regard as worthwhile? What 'floats your boat'? You will have your own particular activities and causes—work, family, nature, sport, music, art, volunteering—that bring you joy and fulfilment. As I write this I am about to go away for five days to sit in a university library where I will read, think, and write. To some that probably sounds like hell! But for me it brings joy. I think I am blessed because the church allows me to exercise a ministry that I find fulfilling, and also allows me time to read and think and write. How wonderful it would be if each of us were liberated to do those things and pursue the course that brought us joy.

In one of the recent discussion groups on the Lord's Prayer, we discussed the idea of sin as that which frustrates and prevents us from doing the things, and being the people, that God intends us to be. We were thinking about sin not so much as individual peccadillos but as systemic—that is, sin as widespread and powerful systems that force us to go along particular routes in life. Poverty is probably the most obvious effect of systemic sin in that it closes down most options for those who are poor. Yet it is not only the poor who are often frustrated but also those with enough money who are frustrated and hemmed in by their own, or by others', expectations and horizons.

Some will argue that the church best helps people to expand their expectations and horizons by concentrating exclusively on 'spiritual' matters; leaving material conditions to those who have the necessary competence: government, employers, and the charitable sector. Yet Jesus drew some uncomfortably close parallels between the spiritual and the material: "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). Jesus could be interpreted here as saying:

'What you most value will be where you find fulfilment.' In this case, Jesus was challenging his hearers to find their treasure—their fulfilment—in God. When doing what God wants becomes our first priority, the fulfilment God brings helps us to view everything else in a different light: our work, our relationships, and our activities.

As we approach Advent and Christmas, we will hear again the story of the birth of Jesus, announced by the angels:

"Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of great joy which will be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord..."

Luke 2:10

Jesus was the fulfilment of God's purpose to save people from purposelessness and frustration by providing a way for people to throw off the chains of sin. And 'sin' here is understood not only as personal, but as the inter-personal conventions and systems that frustrate and limit. Our small contributions to the foodbank and to hosting the homeless shelter are two examples of trying to change material conditions by uniting the spiritual and material in practical service. Please join me in praying: "O God, in your time and by the working of your grace, let these small contributions—like the mustard seed and yeast—bring joy and fulfilment. Amen"

## Winter Shelter

hurch Meeting voted unanimously in favour of hosting a winter shelter again in Pond Square. This will be the 5th season that the shelter has been hosted in Pond Square.

As in previous years the shelter at Highgate URC in Pond Square will be on Sunday evenings in November and December 2015 and January 2016, providing a hot 2-course meal, followed by tea/coffee, chat, Scrabble, chess and a friendly warm environment, then an overnight bed and breakfast. This year the maximum number of people staying overnight in the church will be 18: 16 guests and 2 volunteers (one man and one woman). In previous years our maximum number of guests has been 15 each evening.

C4WS homeless project runs a jobs club and a weekly lunch and dropin advice centre throughout the year as well as the winter shelter from November to March. Demand for their services continues to increase.

This year volunteers at the Pond Square shelter will come from Highgate URC, St Michael's, St Benets, All Saints and beyond, as well as those with no other church connections. On 22 November the food for the evening will be provided and cooked by volunteers at the Jewish community centre JW3 on the Finchley Road as part of their "Mitzvah Day", the day of social action for the community.

For those unable to volunteer in person contributions of tea, coffee, sugar, breakfast cereal, and small containers of toiletries will be gratefully received. Donations of warm clothing and coats are also welcome. We have enough bed linen and towels from previous years.

## Exciting times for Pathway as our ministry continues to expand.....Please pray!

Sometimes in the Pathway Office we talk of the 'dark days'. It was a time when we were struggling to the point that some of us wondered if Pathway would survive. If someone had told me then that a time would come where we would be in a position to have more staff I would have found it difficult to believe them.... and yet by God's grace here we are!

We are so thankful for those of you who commit to regularly pray for



the ministry and support us financially. Whilst we can't thank you all personally, we hope you will be encouraged as you hear how God is continuing to bless the ministry as the team grows.

## Highgate Newtown Community Centre Foodbank

ur food parcels go out each week, we never have a store of food. We work with Brookfield Primary School, which refers parents who struggle to make ends meet. Some of these may have been working and new to benefits, which can take 4–5 weeks to start.

The homeless hostel at the end of our road typically accommodates people who have been ill or in hospital or disabled. Some who enter the hostel have only the clothes on their back, so we support those in the hostel with crisis food parcels.

In our under-fives sessions we discover that some mothers need support with food and children and clothing. As well as providing access to children's services, we are able to provide food as well.

We also serve the general public. Sometimes local people know who is going through a crisis and come to ask for support for them. We have distributed 162 crisis food parcels so far this year. We try to look at a person's overall needs and get them back on course.

We work in a therapeutic way. We do not give out vouchers. In my opinion there is nothing worse than pushing a child in a buggy to a foodbank, an experience that some will remember for the rest of their lives.

We also provide a daily community hot lunch costing £2, and a laundry facility costing £2 per wash.

Your support makes this possible. Thank you for supporting us with your gifts of food and you are welcome to visit anytime.

Great for wildlife but hard to know what to do with it without spending a fortune!
